DHHS: Rural Health Network Development Planning Program (Application

Deadline: February 19, 2025) This funding opportunity supports the planning and development of integrated healthcare networks to achieve efficiencies, expand access, improve the quality of basic healthcare services, strengthen health outcomes, and enhance the rural health care system. Eligible applicants include state, county, and city or township governments; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized) and tribal organizations (other than federally recognized tribal governments); public and state-controlled institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; independent school districts; special district governments; nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education); and for-profit organizations other than small businesses. DHHS: Primary Care Training and Enhancement – Residency Training in Street

Medicine (Application Deadline: March 20, 2025) This program supports training primary care residents in street medicine, focusing on family medicine, internal medicine, pediatrics, and med-peds. DHHS: National Coordinating Center for Language Access Services (Estimated

Application Deadline: April 02, 2025) This funding opportunity aims to establish a National Coordinating Center to connect health and human service professionals with qualified interpreters and translators, improving language access for individuals with limited English proficiency. The project will address gaps in access to services, enhance care quality, and improve health outcomes. Eligible applicants include Native American tribal governments, state and county governments, 501(c)(3) nonprofits, public and private educational institutions, and public housing authorities. DHHS: Rural Maternity and Obstetrics Management Strategies Program

(Estimated Application Deadline: May 13, 2025) This funding opportunity, announced

under the Health Resources and Services Administration's (HRSA) Rural Maternity and Obstetrics Management Strategies (RMOMS) program, aims to establish or continue collaborative improvement and innovation networks to enhance access to and delivery of maternity and obstetrics care in rural areas. Eligible applicants include nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education), Native American tribal governments (federally recognized), and Native American tribal organizations (other than federally recognized tribal governments). TKoster's Charitable Innovated Health Care Award (Application Deadline: February 3, 2025) The TKoster's Charitable Innovated Health Care Award, established by Teresa Koster, provides \$3,500 in funding to support student health centers and their staff in developing innovative practices that improve access to quality health care for students. Eligibility is limited to campus health professionals who are either American College Health Association (ACHA) Individual Members or employed at an ACHA Member Institution. If the applicant is not an Individual Member but is employed at a Member Institution, the institution's Representative Member Individual (RMI) must also sign the application. CCME Grant Program (Application Deadline: June 15, 2025) The CCME Foundation provides grants of \$5,000 to \$50,000 to 501(c)(3) organizations in North and South Carolina for projects that improve healthcare access, quality, and equity. Priority is given to initiatives with measurable outcomes, such as increasing care access, promoting healthy lifestyles, and enhancing patient safety. Eligible applicants include faith-based groups, hospitals, clinics, educational institutions, and community organizations operating in these states. [LEARN MORE](#)

Harold McAlister Charitable Foundation Grant (Letter of Intent Deadline: Rolling-basis) The Harold McAlister Charitable Foundation supports public charities working in healthcare, education, social services, animal welfare, arts and culture, and environmental protection. The foundation prioritizes organizations and proposals that align with its mission of improving lives through effective and impactful initiatives. LabCorp Charitable Foundation Grants (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) The Labcorp Charitable Foundation aims to ensure equitable care, education, and community support. Established in 2020, the foundation provides grants to initiatives such as food pantries, meal programs, healthcare services for underserved populations, STEM education programs, and efforts promoting healthy lifestyles through medical research and screenings. Eligible applicants must be U.S.-based organizations with 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status or equivalent charitable recognition. Requests must align with one of three focus areas: health and welfare, education, or community. Grant reviews occur in March and September. [LEARN MORE](#)

CareSource Foundation: Community Grant (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) The CareSource Foundation offers Community Grants to nonprofits addressing health equity, poverty, and systemic issues affecting underserved populations. These one-year grants prioritize innovative, community-driven solutions that target root causes of disparities and promote sustainable health improvements. Eligible organizations must be 501(c)(3) tax-exempt and primarily serve communities in states where CareSource operates. Funding is typically provided once per organization within a 12-month period, though multiple applications are allowed. [LEARN MORE](#)

Sanofi Philanthropic Donations and Healthcare Contributions (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) Sanofi supports nonprofit organizations aligned with its corporate social responsibility priorities: Health Equity, STEM Education Equity, and Local Communities. Rural Service’s Virtual Living Room Grant Program (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) This funding opportunity integrates rural technology, U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) resources, and local support to encourage veterans to utilize advanced medical technologies. Virtual Living Rooms reduce travel time and costs for veterans while providing access to skilled physicians and VA medical system resources such as telehealth and other online tools. Communities more than an hour from a VA clinic or hospital are eligible, and Virtual Living Rooms can be established in locations such as Veterans of Foreign War lodges, American Legion posts, libraries, firehouses, churches, or community centers. Gilead North America Grants (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) This funding opportunity supports projects across North America that aim to improve access to healthcare, eliminate barriers, and advance education for patients and healthcare professionals. Partnerships with patient advocates, nonprofits, and healthcare professionals are central to enhancing care and community engagement. Only tax-exempt nonprofits are eligible to apply. Moderna Charitable Foundation Grants (Application Deadline: Rolling-basis) This funding opportunity supports organizations that promote public health, improve access to quality healthcare, advance scientific education and innovation, and advocate for diversity and inclusion, especially in underserved populations. Established in 2022, the Moderna Charitable Foundation aims to benefit local and global communities through these grant-making priorities. DHHS: Healthy Tomorrows Partnership for Children Program (HTPCP)

(Application Deadline: March 17, 2025) The Healthy Tomorrows Partnership for Children Program (HTPCP) supports community-based projects that improve access to preventive clinical and public health services for underserved children. Focus areas include behavioral health screenings, immunizations, and adolescent well-visits. Eligible applicants include public and private entities such as governments, tribal organizations, educational institutions, and nonprofits. [LEARN MORE](#)

DHHS: Tribal Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program Grants

(Application Deadline: March 17, 2025) The Tribal MIECHV Program offers 5-year cooperative agreements to federally recognized Indian tribes, tribal organizations, or urban Indian organizations to develop and expand evidence-based home visiting programs for expectant families and families with children from birth to kindergarten. Programs focus on culturally grounded strategies to improve maternal, infant, and child health outcomes; parenting practices; school readiness; socio-economic status; and coordination of community resources. DHHS: Residential Treatment Center Services for Unaccompanied Children

(Estimated Application Deadline: April 04, 2025) This funding opportunity seeks to provide high-quality, child-centered care for unaccompanied children, ensuring their safety and well-being. Services must operate 24/7 and be able to accept children at any time, as long as they comply with state licensing requirements and ensure safety. While children in the Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) care remain under federal legal custody, their physical care is provided by care providers. Applicants are not required to have licensing at the time of application but must secure full licensing before accepting children within the specified timeframes. Eligible applicants include Native American tribal governments (federally recognized) and tribal organizations (other than federally recognized), state, county, and city or township governments, public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities, independent school districts, special district governments, public and private institutions of higher education, nonprofits with or

without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education), for-profit organizations other than small businesses, and small businesses. [LEARN MORE](#)

DHHS: Maternity Group Home (Estimated Application Deadline: April 28, 2025)

The Maternity Group Home (MGH) program provides safe and stable housing for pregnant and parenting youth ages 16 to under 22 and their children for up to 18 months, or 21 months under special circumstances. Services include parenting skills, child development, budgeting, and health education, alongside transitional living services to support economic independence and long-term well-being. Eligible applicants include public and nonprofit entities, tribal governments, educational institutions, housing authorities, and faith-based organizations. [LEARN MORE](#)

DHHS: FY 2025 Preschool Development Grant Birth Through Five (PDG B-5)

Planning Grant (Estimated Application Deadline: May 01, 2025) The Office of Early Childhood Development within the Administration for Children and Families, in collaboration with the Department of Education, invites applications for the FY 2025 Preschool Development Grant Birth Through Five (PDG B-5) Planning Grant. This grant supports states and territories in undertaking systems-building and improvement activities for early childhood education, rather than direct-service provision. Rutherford County Endowment (Application Deadline: March 1, 2025) The Rutherford County Endowment supports 501(c)(3) nonprofits, public agencies, and other eligible organizations serving Rutherford County. Grants range from \$2,500 to \$10,000 and fund programmatic and capital needs, with priority given to projects that

benefit the community in areas like education, health, arts, and the environment. General operating support requests are accepted but given lower priority. Applicants benefiting from another organization must include a letter of endorsement. Funds must be used within one year of the award, and only one application is allowed per organization annually. Speedway Children’s Charities’ North Wilkesboro Grant Program (Application Deadline: June 27, 2025) The North Wilkesboro Grant Program, organized by Speedway Children's Charities, supports efforts to meet the critical needs of children in Wilkes County, North Carolina. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, Speedway Children's Charities raises funds through various events and distributes them to deserving children's organizations. This program is designed to address essential needs and make a positive impact on children's lives. Funding is available exclusively to existing 501(c)(3) nonprofit charities whose primary focus is children in Wilkes County, North Carolina. Economic development grants support affordable housing, small business assistance, community services, and revitalization initiatives in low- to moderate-income neighborhoods. DHHS: Rural Veterans Health Access Program (Estimated Application Deadline: February 05, 2025) This program provides funding to states to collaborate with providers and partners to enhance healthcare access and improve care coordination for veterans in rural areas. Only states with current Medicare Rural Hospital Flexibility Program awards and certified critical access hospitals are eligible to apply, with one application permitted per state as designated by the Governor. DHHS: Rural Healthcare Provider Transition Project (Estimated Application Deadline: April 07, 2025) This funding opportunity aims to provide technical assistance to small rural hospitals and rural health clinics (RHCs) to strengthen essential elements of value-based care, including quality, efficiency, patient experience, and safety of care. Eligible applicants include domestic public, private, and nonprofit entities, such as domestic faith-based and community-based organizations, tribes, and tribal organizations. Additional eligible entities include state, county, and city or township governments; Native American tribal governments (federally recognized) and tribal organizations (other than federally recognized); public and private institutions of higher education; nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education); for-profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses; special district governments; and independent school districts. DHHS: Title V Competitive Sexual Risk Avoidance Education (Estimated Application Deadline: May 01, 2025) The Title V Competitive Sexual Risk Avoidance Education (SRAE) program funds projects that teach youth how to voluntarily refrain from sexual activity. Projects must use medically accurate information, implement evidence-based strategies, promote personal responsibility, and discourage risky behaviors like sexual coercion and underage drinking. The program should be culturally appropriate and age appropriate. Eligible applicants include local organizations or consortia in states and territories that did not accept FY2024 allocations for Title V State SRAE. Nonprofits that do not have a 501(c)(3) status with the IRS, other than institutions of higher education, are eligible to apply. [LEARN MORE](#)

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Black Mountain-Swannanoa Valley Endowment Fund (Application Deadline: March 1, 2025) The Black Mountain-Swannanoa Valley Endowment Fund supports innovative projects and programs in the Swannanoa Valley that focus on health and

wellness, education, cultural and natural resources, and helping people in need. Grants ranging from \$2,500 to \$10,000 are provided for programmatic, equipment, technology, and capital needs, with priority given to new initiatives rather than continued support or general operating expenses. Eligible applicants are 501(c)(3) organizations, government entities, educational, and religious organizations serving the Black Mountain and Swannanoa Valley area, specifically the Owen School District. Kentucky Fried Wishes Grant Program – Improving Health & Wellbeing

(Application Deadline: April 18, 2025) The KFC Foundation will award \$10,000 grants to 100 nonprofit organizations, totaling \$1 million, to fund actionable projects that improve health and wellbeing in local communities. Eligible projects include initiatives such as creating mobile health clinics, upgrading playgrounds, improving domestic violence shelters, and providing accommodations for individuals with disabilities. Applicants must be recognized 501(c)(3) nonprofit organizations, governmental entities, or other IRS-recognized charitable organizations that have maintained good standing with the Internal Revenue Service for at least two years. Organizations must be based in the United States and serve individuals within the U.S., operating on a local level or as an affiliate or chapter of a larger organization that operates locally. Projects must directly benefit the surrounding community, with preference given to those that can be completed within 6-12 months. [LEARN MORE](#)

Cape Fear Memorial Foundation Grant (Application Deadline: June 16, 2025) The Cape Fear Memorial Foundation, a private non-operating foundation based in Wilmington, NC, supports the health and wellness needs of southeastern North Carolina by funding local nonprofit organizations. Its priority is to fund programs and organizations that promote health education, disease prevention, and direct medical and health services, aligning with its core granting philosophy. Eligible applicants must be qualified under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, excluding private, non-operating foundations as defined by Section 509(a). Public instrumentalities providing services to improve the general health and welfare of the community are also eligible. Additionally, qualifying organizations must provide services within at least one of the following counties: Brunswick, Columbus, Duplin, Pender, or New Hanover.

Philip L. Van Every Foundation Grants (Letter of Inquiry Deadline: August 10, 2025) The Philip L. Van Every Foundation supports 501(c)(3) organizations in North and South Carolina focused on education, healthcare, human/community services, and arts/culture/history. NIH: Nutrition Obesity Research Centers (Application Deadline: June 10, 2025)

The National Institutes of Health (NIH) invites applications from institutions and organizations to establish core centers under the Nutrition Obesity Research Centers (NORC) program. This initiative is designed to support and enhance the national research effort in nutrition and obesity by integrating and expanding existing research programs. The NORC program focuses on three primary research-related activities: Research Core services, a Pilot and Feasibility (P and F) program, and an Enrichment program. These activities aim to improve the efficiency, productivity, effectiveness, and multidisciplinary approach of research efforts in the fields of nutrition and obesity.
