National Institutes of Health: Notice of Intent to Publish a Funding Opportunity Announcement – Technology Development to Reduce Health Disparities (R01 – Clinical Trial Optional)^{NEW!}

Deadline: January 26, 2026 (*Forecasted*)

Award Amount/Ceiling: Unspecified amount

Description: The National Institute of Biomedical Imaging and Bioengineering intends to announce a forthcoming Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) seeking applications for research aimed at developing biomedical technologies that reduce disparities in healthcare access and health outcomes. Proposed technologies should be effective, affordable, socially acceptable, and deliverable to underserved populations. This advance notice is provided to allow investigators time to prepare collaborative, responsive projects. Applications are not being accepted at this time. The future NOFO will utilize the R01 activity code. Eligible applicants include public, private, and independent school district educational institutions; federally recognized Tribal governments; county and state governments; public and Indian housing authorities; nonprofit organizations with 501(c)(3) status; other Tribal organizations; small businesses; and other for-profit organizations. Award Amount/Ceiling: Unspecified amount

Description: The National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD) intends to announce a Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) to support research sites within the EmbraceHealth Clinical Research Network. The Network's overarching purpose is to establish and maintain an agile clinical research infrastructure capable of addressing emerging, urgent, and chronic health needs among populations experiencing health disparities. Each site or consortium will be responsible for developing, testing, and implementing clinical and behavioral interventions tailored to

key public health challenges with documented disparities. Interventions must demonstrate feasibility, scalability, and reproducibility while strengthening both routine healthcare services and the integration of clinical practice with scientific research in lower-resourced healthcare settings. Eligible applicants include state, county, and federally recognized Tribal governments; public and Indian housing authorities; small and other for-profit businesses; independent school districts; public, state, and private higher education institutions; nonprofit organizations with 501(c)(3) status; and Tribal organizations. Indian Health Service: Tribal Management Grant (TMG) Program^{NEW!}

Deadline: March 27, 2026 (*Forecasted*)

Award Amount/Ceiling: Unspecified amount

Description: The Tribal Management Grant (TMG) Program is a competitive funding opportunity designed to strengthen the capacity of federally recognized Indian Tribes and Tribal Organizations (T/TOs). The program supports the development of management capabilities necessary for Tribes to assume, develop, or improve programs, functions, services, and activities (PFSAs) currently operated by the Indian Health Service. Established shortly after the passage of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975, the TMG Program helps T/TOs build the administrative and organizational capacity required for self-determination and effective Tribal health management. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention – NCEZID: Building National Partnerships for the Prevention of Emerging and Reemerging Infectious Diseases^{NEW!}

Award Amount/Ceiling: Up to \$30,000,000

Description: This cooperative agreement aims to strengthen the nation's ability to prevent, detect, and respond to infectious disease threats by establishing a single, integrated funding mechanism. Funding will support clinicians, healthcare professionals, healthcare systems, institutions, and organizations engaged in patient care, public health, and infectious disease control across the United States. The program is designed to enhance frontline capacity, improve implementation of timely public health

responses, and generate expert insights to inform and strengthen public health guidance and practice. Eligible applicants include county, city, township, special district, and state governments; federally recognized tribal governments; public and Indian housing authorities; small businesses and other for-profit organizations; independent school districts; public, state, and private institutions of higher education; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status; and other tribal organizations. National Institutes of Health: NLM Information Resource Grants to Reduce Health Disparities and Promote Health for All (G08 Clinical Trial Not Allowed)

Deadline: May 25, 2026

Award Amount/ceiling: \$200,000

Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity Announcement (NOFO) solicits resource grant applications for projects that will provide accurate, useful, usable, and understandable health information to populations that experience health disparities and their health care providers. Projects should harness the capabilities of information technology and medical or health libraries to disseminate clear, evidence-based health-related information in formats used by individuals and their health care providers. Emphasis should be on developing or improving information resources or services that reduce health disparities and promote health access for all. Eligible applicants include businesses (small businesses and other for-profits), nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status, Native American tribal organizations, governments at all levels, public and Indian housing authorities, educational institutions, independent school districts, and other entities. Administration for Community Living: Advancing Whole-Person Health – Enhancing Networks of Community-Based Aging and Disability Organizations to Improve Access to Long-Term Services and Supports^{NEW!}

Deadline: May 31, 2026 (*Forecasted*)

Award Amount/Ceiling: Up to \$3,800,000

Description: The Administration for Community Living (ACL) intends to award a single cooperative agreement over a three-year project period to support the development of a regional community care hub (CCH) scaling strategy. This initiative aims to expand access to long-term services and supports (LTSS) for older adults and people with disabilities as part of a broader No Wrong Door System effort. The funded entity will

collaborate with ACL to support approximately three regional advanced CCHs by strengthening shared infrastructure, facilitating alignment with existing CCHs and community-based aging and disability organizations, and providing technical assistance. Activities will include helping the selected hubs expand their capacity to streamline access to LTSS through health care payer partnerships, including services such as care transitions, care coordination, and evidence-based prevention and health promotion programs. Eligible applicants include city, county, state, special district, and federally recognized Tribal governments; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status; Tribal organizations; and public or private institutions of higher education. Description: Supports the Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) Program hubs. These hubs will form part of a national, collaborative consortium designed to accelerate the translation of scientific discoveries into health benefits for all communities. The program aims to advance clinical and translational science through operational innovations, robust research partnerships, strategies to address health disparities, and training programs for clinical research professionals, and as a resource to support public health response. Eligible applicants include nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education), for profit organizations other than small businesses, federally recognized and other Native American tribal organizations, independent and special district governments, higher education institutions, small businesses, public housing authorities, faith-based or community-based organizations and regional organizations. National Kidney Foundation Inc.: Kidney Health Equity Community Engagement Award *NEW!*

Award Amount/Ceiling: \$75,000 for one year

Description: The National Kidney Foundation (NKF) seeks proposals designed to advance health equity in kidney health at the community level. Projects must aim to improve access to kidney care, support effective kidney disease management, and enhance patient outcomes. Eligible applicants include healthcare professionals, researchers, and multidisciplinary teams affiliated with U.S. health systems, academic medical centers, FQHCs, and other healthcare organizations that serve individuals with kidney disease. Description: The Bob Woodruff Foundation provides funding for programs that serve the military and veteran community, with a focus on improving the health and well-being of service members, veterans, their families, and caregivers. Priority areas include improving social determinants of health, decreasing barriers to physical and mental healthcare, increasing access to programming that fosters a healthy lifestyle, and enhancing opportunities for veterans to thrive after service. Description: The Alfred H. and Janet L. Lander Family Charitable Foundation is a qualified 501(c)(3) private operating foundation that conducts charitable work meeting its mission to uplift individuals and families through community programming in three areas: promoting and supporting the physical and mental health of the community through fitness opportunities and access to services, resources, and qualified care

providers; providing a strong foundation for learning at all ages and levels, including programs that improve workforce placement and success; and assisting individuals and families in meeting basic needs while creating a pathway for upward mobility. Grant funds must be used to support students with a documented history of chronic absenteeism, behavioral challenges, or declining academic performance by expanding mental health services. Description: The Social Impact Funds support community-led transformation by strategically deploying capital to social entrepreneurs who are using their lived experience to address three vital social drivers of health: health care access and quality, food security, and economic empowerment. Description: The CareSource Foundation offers Community Grants to nonprofits addressing health equity, poverty, and systemic issues affecting underserved populations. These one-year grants prioritize innovative, community-driven solutions that target root causes of disparities and promote sustainable health improvements. Eligible organizations must be 501(c)(3) tax-exempt and primarily serve communities in states where CareSource operates. Funding is typically provided once per organization within a 12-month period, though multiple applications are allowed. Priority is given to organizations, collaboratives and initiatives that deploy innovative solutions. We select groups that address root problems rather than treat symptoms, engage the community

voice in the solution and aim for meaningful improvements to health and wellness.

Most grants are awarded to tax-exempt organizations, but funding may also be provided to non-501(c)(3) entities under specific conditions. The organization's work should align with the Commonwealth Fund's mission, which includes improving health care access, quality, and efficiency, with a focus on vulnerable populations. Award Amount/ceiling: Up to \$15,000,000

Description: The Administration for Children and Families (ACF), Office of Head Start (OHS) announces the availability of approximately \$15 million to competitively operate the Head Start National Center (NC) on Early Learning, Health, and Family Engagement (ELHFE). This center will provide research-informed training and technical assistance that promotes best practices to strengthen Head Start program services in education, health, and family engagement. The goal is to deliver professional development and resources that support continuous program improvement, increase staff knowledge and skills, align content with states, Tribes, and territories, and improve outcomes for children and families in early learning, health, mental health, safety, and family wellbeing. Because Head Start's comprehensive services are complex and expansive, the primary recipient will be expected to bring together knowledgeable subrecipients in early learning, health, and family engagement. Eligible applicants include government entities, higher education institutions, nonprofits, for-profit organizations, small businesses, and Native American tribal governments and organizations. Description: The NIAID seeks to support longitudinal studies of infants and mother-infant dyads to understand how influenza infections and vaccinations shape infant and childhood immunity, including the effects of initial exposure in utero or after birth. Projects may examine maternal influenza immune status and its impact on neonatal responses. The goal is to provide data to guide the design of durable, broadly protective influenza vaccines. Eligible applicants include state and local governments, federally

recognized Native American tribal governments, public and Indian housing authorities, county governments, public and private higher education institutions, independent school districts, small businesses, for-profit organizations, other Native American tribal organizations, and nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status. The grant supports proven, replicable models such as Multisystemic Therapy (MST), Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT), Strengthening Families, The Incredible Years, Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), and Positive Parenting Program (Triple-P). - Financial support from other sources exists to ensure that the project will be implemented and continue after the grant period. It will expedite the review process if a material portion of the total funds needed for the project have been secured before applying.
