Health Resources and Services Administration: Service Area Competition^{NEW!}

Deadline: March 16, 2026

Award Amount/Ceiling: \$1,532,750

Description: The FY 2026 Health Center Program Service Area Competition (SAC) funding improves the health of underserved communities and populations by providing grants to support the delivery of comprehensive, high-quality primary health care services in the United States and its territories. Eligible applicants include federally recognized Native American tribal governments; county governments; public and Indian housing authorities; city or township governments; state governments; special district governments; nonprofits non-higher education without 501(c)(3); nonprofits non-higher education with 501(c)(3); and other. Indian Health Service: Tribal Management Grant (TMG) Program

Deadline: March 27, 2026 (*Forecasted*)

Award Amount/Ceiling: Unspecified amount

Description: The Tribal Management Grant (TMG) Program is a competitive funding opportunity designed to strengthen the capacity of federally recognized Indian Tribes and Tribal Organizations (T/TOs). The program supports the development of management capabilities necessary for Tribes to assume, develop, or improve programs, functions, services, and activities (PFSAs) currently operated by the Indian Health Service. Established shortly after the passage of the Indian Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act of 1975, the TMG Program helps T/TOs build the administrative and organizational capacity required for self-determination and effective Tribal health management. Description: The Technology-enabled Collaborative Learning Program will support the use of technology-enabled collaborative learning to improve retention of health care providers and increase access to health care services in rural and underserved areas. Eligible applicants include nonprofits non-higher education with 501(c)(3); other Native American tribal organizations; nonprofits non-higher education without 501(c)(3); private institutions of higher education; independent school districts; public and state institutions of higher education; special district governments; state governments; city or township governments; federally recognized Native American tribal governments; county governments; for-profit organizations other than small businesses; and small businesses. Description: The Telehealth Nutrition Services Network Grant Program will support telehealth networks that improve access to quality health care services through telehealth technology. This program will focus on chronic disease prevention and chronic disease management through comprehensive telehealth nutrition services. Health Resources and Services Administration: Rural Residency Planning and Development Program ^{NEW!}

Award Amount/Ceiling: \$750,000

Description: The Rural Residency Planning and Development (RRPD) program improves and expands rural health care access by developing new, accredited, sustainable rural residency programs, including rural track programs (RTPs). Newly created rural physician residency programs increase training and ultimately practice in rural areas to address physician shortages. The RRPD program provides start-up funding to create new rural residency programs in qualifying medical specialties. Long-term sustainability funding must come from viable and stable sources, such as Medicare, Medicaid, and other public or private sources. Qualifying medical specialties are family medicine, internal medicine, preventive medicine, psychiatry, general surgery, and obstetrics and gynecology. Eligible applicants include state governments; city or township governments; special district governments; county governments; federally recognized Native American tribal governments; small businesses; for-profit organizations other than small businesses; nonprofits non-higher education without 501(c)(3); nonprofits non-higher education with 501(c)(3); other Native American tribal organizations; private institutions of higher education; independent school districts; public and state institutions of higher education; and other. National Institutes of Health: NLM Information Resource Grants to Reduce Health Disparities and Promote Health for All (G08 Clinical Trial Not Allowed)

Award Amount/ceiling: \$200,000

Description: This Notice of Funding Opportunity Announcement (NOFO) solicits resource grant applications for projects that will provide accurate, useful, usable, and understandable health information to populations that experience health disparities and their health care providers. Projects should harness the capabilities of information technology and medical or health libraries to disseminate clear, evidence-based health-related information in formats used by individuals and their health care providers. Emphasis should be on developing or improving information resources or services that reduce health disparities and promote health access for all. Eligible applicants include businesses (small businesses and other for-profits), nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status, Native American tribal organizations, governments at all levels, public and Indian

Administration for Community Living: Advancing Whole-Person Health – Enhancing Networks of Community-Based Aging and Disability Organizations to Improve Access to Long-Term Services and Supports

Deadline: May 31, 2026 (*Forecasted*)

Award Amount/Ceiling: Up to \$3,800,000

Description: The Administration for Community Living (ACL) intends to award a single cooperative agreement over a three-year project period to support the development of a regional community care hub (CCH) scaling strategy. This initiative aims to expand access to long-term services and supports (LTSS) for older adults and people with disabilities as part of a broader No Wrong Door System effort. The funded entity will collaborate with ACL to support approximately three regional advanced CCHs by strengthening shared infrastructure, facilitating alignment with existing CCHs and community-based aging and disability organizations, and providing technical assistance. Activities will include helping the selected hubs expand their capacity to streamline access to LTSS through health care payer partnerships, including services such as care transitions, care coordination, and evidence-based prevention and health promotion programs. Eligible applicants include city, county, state, special district, and federally recognized Tribal governments; nonprofit organizations with or without 501(c)(3) status; Tribal organizations; and public or private institutions of higher education. Award Amount/ceiling: \$2,600,000 - \$6,500,000

Description: Supports the Clinical and Translational Science Award (CTSA) Program hubs. These hubs will form part of a national, collaborative consortium designed to accelerate the translation of scientific discoveries into health benefits for all communities. The program aims to advance clinical and translational science through operational innovations, robust research partnerships, strategies to address health disparities, and training programs for clinical research professionals, and as a resource to support public health response. Eligible applicants include nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status (other than institutions of higher education), for profit organizations

other than small businesses, federally recognized and other Native American tribal organizations, independent and special district governments, higher education institutions, small businesses, public housing authorities, faith-based or community-based organizations and regional organizations. Description: The School-Based Healthcare Solutions Network (SBHSN) is a private grant-giving organization that funds and supports under-resourced public and public charter schools. The program aims to expand access to quality mental health services on school campuses. Grant funds must be used to support students with a documented history of chronic absenteeism, behavioral challenges, or declining academic performance by expanding mental health services. Description: The Early Childhood Comprehensive Systems SEED Project: Scaling Effective Early Childhood Systems Development (ECCS SEED) addresses the root causes of chronic disease in early childhood by improving families' access to health care, screening children early for physical and mental health needs, and connecting parents to services that enable them to provide for their children. The ECCS SEED Project will partner with states and communities to support evidence-based strategies that improve access to quality care for prenatal-to-age-5 (P-5) families and promote healthy child development and family well-being. Eligible applicants include for-profit organizations other than small businesses; small businesses; nonprofits non-higher education with 501(c)(3); nonprofits non-higher education without 501(c)(3); other Native American tribal organizations; independent school districts; public and state institutions of higher education; private institutions of higher education; state governments; county governments; city or township governments; special district governments; and federally recognized Native American tribal governments. Deadline: February 15, 2026 | June 15, 2026

Award Amount/Ceiling: Unspecified amount

Description: The James M. Cox Foundation provides philanthropic support for nonprofit organizations in communities where Cox Enterprises operates. Funding priorities include conservation and environment with investments in biodiversity, habitat protection, and restoration of natural areas such as rivers, land, and endangered species, along with parks and green spaces; early childhood education and literacy programs that support teachers and help children build strong reading skills; initiatives that expand access to healthy food, affordable housing, and support services to help people improve their lives; and programs that improve access to quality healthcare and patient experience. The grant supports proven, replicable models such as Multisystemic Therapy (MST), Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT), Strengthening Families, The Incredible Years, Trauma-Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT), and Positive Parenting Program (Triple-P).
