## Access to Care (Health Care Workforce)

### Federal Grants

#### **Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) – Improving Diagnostic Safety in Ambulatory Care: Strategies and Interventions (R18) (PA-23-290)**

**Deadline:** Opportunity expires May 26, 2028

**Award Amount/Ceiling:** Up to \$500,000 total costs/year, Maximum of \$2,000,000 total costs for up to 4 years

**Description:** This opportunity supports teams to design, implement, and evaluate practical strategies/interventions that reduce diagnostic errors in ambulatory care, where workflows, handoffs, and testing/communication processes vary widely across settings. Applicants are expected to propose an intervention approach grounded in patient safety/quality improvement methods, with a clear plan to test how the strategy works in real outpatient environments and how it can be adopted or scaled. AHRQ emphasizes attention to health equity and diagnostic disparities, including planning for recruitment and inclusion of populations that experience health disparities when relevant to the project aims. Funded projects are expected to track and report real-world implementation “reach” (e.g., practices/clinicians/patients reached) and whether targeted safety processes or outcomes improve. #### **Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) – Small Health Services Research Grant Program (R03) (PA-24-155)**

**Deadline:** Opportunity expires July 17, 2029

**Award Amount/Ceiling:** Up to \$100,000 total costs for the entire project period; project period up to 2 years

**Description:** This opportunity supports small, early-stage or tightly-scoped health services research projects that can be completed quickly and produce actionable evidence aligned with AHRQ’s priority areas (quality & patient safety; delivery & practice improvement; whole-person care) across real-world healthcare settings. AHRQ explicitly positions the R03 for project types like pilot/feasibility studies, secondary analysis of existing data, small self-contained research projects, and development of research methods or new research technology. Applicants propose a discrete research plan that is sufficiently justified through literature and/or existing data sources (AHRQ notes preliminary data are not required, particularly for pilot/feasibility studies), with a clear path to producing findings that can inform healthcare practice and policy. **Deadline:** November 5, 2029

**Award Amount/Ceiling:** Up to \$500,000 total costs/year, Maximum of \$2.5M total costs for up

to 5 years

**Description:** This opportunity supports research that examines what “high-quality primary care” looks like in practice and how to strengthen it, including core features such as care coordination, continuity, comprehensiveness, person-centered whole healthcare, clinician–patient relationships, and trust. Applicants propose studies grounded in real primary care environments (often in partnership with practices, communities, and patients) that generate evidence decision-makers can use to improve primary care delivery, models of care, workforce approaches, financing/payment, and use of data/technology in primary care. AHRQ emphasizes projects that address health disparities and diagnostic/healthcare inequities and that include a clear discussion of how findings could be implemented to improve primary care delivery or patient outcomes and be sustained over time. **Description:** The purpose of this Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is to seek health services research grant applications focused on AHRQ research priorities, including improving healthcare quality and patient safety, improving healthcare delivery and practice improvement, and enhancing whole-person healthcare delivery. AHRQ supports research in all healthcare settings, including the hospital, long-term care, ambulatory care, home healthcare, pharmacy, and care transitions between settings. ## **Federal Communications Commission (FCC) / Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) – Rural Health Care Healthcare Connect Fund Program**

**Deadline:** April 1, 2026

**Award Amount/Ceiling:** 65% discount on eligible expenses

**Description:** This program supports eligible rural health care providers (and qualifying consortia) to plan, competitively procure, and deploy broadband connectivity solutions that enable healthcare delivery in rural communities—typically by securing eligible broadband services and/or building out network capability needed for care delivery. Applicants proceed through a structured process that starts with confirming site eligibility and rurality/consortium status, then (where required) posting a request for services and selecting a service provider consistent with USAC competitive bidding rules, followed by submitting a funding request through USAC's RHC systems. **Description:** This NOFO invites Large Research Demonstration and Dissemination (R18) Project applications that focus on AHRQ's mission and/or any aspect of its specific priority areas, described in detail below. The Research Demonstration and Dissemination Grant (R18) is an award made by AHRQ to an institution/organization to support a discrete, specified health services research project designed to develop, test, and evaluate health service activities and to foster the application of existing knowledge. The R18 research plan proposed by the applicant institution/organization must be related to the mission and portfolio priority research interests of AHRQ. **Award Amount/Ceiling:** \$24,000,000 total with 8 expected awards.

**Description:** The FY 2026 National Technical Assistance Programs (NTAP) Cooperative Agreements support national organizations that provide technical assistance to health centers and organizations seeking to become health centers. Activities focus on strengthening primary health care delivery, improving chronic disease management and preventive services, increasing operational effectiveness and quality, and addressing emerging public health priorities. ## **AHRQ Understanding and Improving Diagnostic Safety in Ambulatory Care: Incidence and Contributing Factors (R01) (PA-23-291)**

**Deadline:** July 6, 2028

**Award Amount/Ceiling:** Up to \$500,000 total costs per year, with a maximum of \$2,000,000 total costs over a project period of up to four years.

**Description:** This opportunity funds health services research to understand diagnostic safety in ambulatory care, including estimating incidence and identifying contributing factors across the wide variety of outpatient settings (e.g., primary care, urgent care, emergency medicine, telemedicine, specialty ambulatory services). Applicants may propose rigorous approaches to detect and characterize diagnostic error (and “diagnostic inequities”) using methods and data sources appropriate to ambulatory care, then analyze how organizational context, workflows, information systems, communication/coordination, and patient/clinician factors contribute to error. AHRQ encourages interdisciplinary teams, explicitly including skills beyond traditional hospital medical fields, to advance the science of diagnostic safety in these heterogeneous environments. Eligible applicants include public or private institutions of higher education; nonprofits with or without 501(c)(3) status; for-profit organizations (including small businesses); state, county, city, township, and special district governments; federally recognized and non-federally recognized tribal governments and tribal organizations; independent school districts; public housing authorities/Indian housing authorities; regional organizations; faith-based or community-based organizations; and U.S. territory or possession governments. **Description:** PCORI is accepting Letters of Intent for its Engagement Award: Capacity Building opportunity, supporting projects that build the skills and capacity of patients, caregivers, and other healthcare community members to partner in patient-centered comparative clinical effectiveness research. Projects must clearly show how they will build capacity for patient-centered CER, and PCORI emphasizes meaningful partner engagement throughout project development and delivery. This is a two-step process: submit an LOI first, and only invited applicants may submit a full proposal, so applicants should be ready to demonstrate strong program fit and engagement plans early. NC organizations are eligible as U.S.-based applicants, and PCORI's broader funding portfolio includes North Carolina-based projects, though this opportunity is nationally competitive.
